Principal Cory Cardinal Sr comments, "We pulled together the highest level of talent in First Nation Education across Turtle Island and brought the team together in a way that worked so well. Our Nation's Chief and Council, the team of coaches, our support staff, our teachers, our parents in our community, and our Elders have incredible support for the program and how it is developing." Hereditary Chief Sydney Lee Halcrow echoed Principal Cardinal's comments. "We believe that at the end of the day, sports; in particular Hockey, provided all the knowledge, skills, and attributes necessary for our children to grow and become successful in life. We believe that education is "ever increasing knowledge!" Our schools' educate student's minds no matter what age. We develop physical character in our students, enhance emotional well being, and most importantly, we provide that spiritual connection that ties all students Indigenous or Non-Indigenous to our Cree Language, our Cree Traditions, Practices, Ceremony, Culture, Values and Morals.

in order to drive home the success that Chief Halcrow speaks about above, players, their teachers and coaches ensure that player development focuses on having fun and enjoying the game, with an equal amount of commitment to continual improvement and buy in to the academically robust and rigorous curriculum of the Sports Academy Hockey Program. Evidence



is seen at every on ice session where players who were once using an ice aide in the "Learn to Skate" program advance to stickhandling, game dynamics, and knowledge and skill development in the "Hockey Development Program".

The team of professionals that developed and run the Hockey Academy have used best practices and researched based best teaching and learning experiences as a combination when setting up the Hockey Development Program plan. A strong foundational skating program develops the players core strengths and then is added to by advanced hockey knowledge and skills training. Student buy in is seen in the absolutely incredible work ethic shown by the players. "Watching the students, seeing their love for Hockey, and their growth mindsets, makes me so proud of what we are doing," says Boh Kubrakovich-Kiniw, Director of the Sports Academy and Superintendent of the schools. He adds, "Everyone is committed to this, from Chief and Council all the way to our staff to students and parents, we are all working towards one goal ...betterment of our students!"

Challenging "Core" course loads in the morning, KFN Students understand the importance of having high academics to be successful. Good standing in all their courses, coupled with working hard on the Nêhiyawêwin language, gives appropriate balance between the academics of the mind and the academics of the physical body. Students excel! Students achieve! Students believe!

This is evidenced by a story relayed by one of the coaches in their weekly Coaches meeting. "I was having the students work really hard, pushing their limits, trying to get them to do even better than they did in the last practice, and they appeared to be struggling. So I pulled them together for a motivational speech about giving your all - all the time. After my "pep talk" one of the young U9 players looks up to me and says, "but coach it's just a game", to which I retorted, "No son, its not just a game. It's the Nêhiyawêwin way - where we give our all - all the time! We endure the pain. We survive and we grow in wisdom - the Nêhiyawêwin way - Remember this!

Nêhiyawak View from Principal Cardinal



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
Professional Dev't from Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School and First Nation Distance Education Centre (FNDLC)

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
