Learning off the land is the Nêhiyawak way of life long learning

Kapawe'no First Nation - At Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School we are achieving excellence with our Land, Air and Water (LAW) program.

Learning for children and young adults "on and from the land" should be integral to understanding the ways of educating students with "on the ground" practices being placed in the forefront of education for First Nation students.

We know that knowledge builds knowledge. Knowledge is the key to reading comprehension. Shared knowledge makes communication possible and enhances the ability of students to learn, to grow, and to come to know.

Knowledge gained through land-based schooling puts the emphasis on teaching and learning at its earliest stage – birth. From birth to age 4-5 children learn Nehiyawak Education. It is only at this later age where they enter the Euro-Canadian K-Grade 12 educational system. From here on it is a parallel education that our children receive with First Nation Education on one side and the Euro-Canadian education on the other. In the end, both gift our children the knowledge, skills, and attributes required for living in today's world.

What is important to understand with our method of teaching is that we are taking control of Nehiyawak Education. We are the stewards who are saying what is taught and how it is taught. No longer reliant on the bindings imposed upon us by a Western European culture that has done far more harm than good, we are recreating our educational programming for the good of our Nations. And we are doing it through traditional means and methods, momentarily lost to us because of colonization and the Residential School



System. At Kapawe'no First Nation School we have experienced a growth of students more than we could have anticipated.

Students from High Prairie, Gift Lake, Sucker Creek, Whitefish Lake, Sturgeon Lake, Lubicon Lake, Bigstone, Little Red River, Loon River, and Woodland are all attending our school. We also have many students from Grouard attending. They are with us because of our method of teaching. We teach the Nêhiyawak way with Nêhiyawêwin and drum every morning, followed by traditional knowledge sharing. Our Elders are involved with the school and our school even has a special Elder's room set up for them.

Our land-based programming called LAW (land, air and water) is not simply an outdoor education program which undermines classroom experience, it is merely classroom

experience taken into the outdoors that builds great knowledge and traditional skills within our Nation's children and youth. Math, Science, Social Studies, Physical Education, English, and Nehiyawewin Language all come alive in an environment that has the dual responsibility of providing students with the knowledge, skills and foundations necessary to thrive in their community as well as in higher education outside of their community.

This responsibility requires teachers and staff to be capable of developing and implementing lessons that support academic excellence and cultural enrichment as well as Nehiyawewin development all at the same time. We have such teachers in place as each staff member was hand picked for the school and gave a full commitment to the mission and vision we have in place.

To date we have participated in numerous initiatives to make our students more aware of their responsibility to ensure no person forgets the real pain caused by residential schooling which continues to this day, or the need to not forget their missing or murdered brothers and sisters. We started our year with Tipi teachings and had students set up and take down tipis on Nation Lands.

Our students have prepared a moose hide to create the grandfather drum from it, have harvested medicines most recently and last year field dressed a moose harvested by one of the students in grade 10. They built a rack, cut and prepared meat for smoking, used every part of the moose as it was traditionally intended and for the past week have enjoyed smoked meat and ribs, dried meat, bone marrow and more.




Sports Central and Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School a winning combination

Philosophy on preparation for upcoming season in sport using plyometric, bounding and running

Kapawe'no First Nation - Mr Brian Thomas has been with us for a few months and his philosophy of preparing for the high level is beginning to set in.


As a former world class long jumper Mr Thomas emphasis and concentration is on plyometric, bounding and running. Over his years of experience all sport is based in these three principals.

Running: To get from point A to point B fast and efficient without any wasted motion. Example head back, clench teeth and flagging arms takes away from the speed you're trying to generate.

Plyometric: Is hopping, bounding and

drop jumps in the form of plyometric, which enhances your physical endurance. Bounding: Helps increase you're running and explosive muscle in your body, enabling the athlete to perform at peak physical output. The three discipline together will generate

> high performance athletes. Here Kapaweno at Nêhiyawak School athletes will be introduced to this type of training and recovery techniques. His objective is to produce high performance multisport male and athletes Kapawe'no Nêhiyawak School.


I would go through fonts that I had on my computer and the students would pick out the font that they like. I would have the students to select the colour or colours


Dry meat making part of sovereignty and food class
