
Cory Cardinal Sr comes to the First Nation Distance Learning Center with an impressive background in education and nation engagement




Guardian of the Nêhiyawak Territory: The Ahcahk Muskwa (Spirit Bear)

In the heart of the Nêhiyawak territory, nestled within the forest and lake lived a Nation that shared a profound connection with Mother Earth. Their lives were intimately entwined with the rhythms of the forest, and the creatures, both two and four-legged, that inhabited it held a sacred place in their hearts. Among these creatures was Ahcahk Muskwa, the Spirit Bear—a majestic, rare, and almost magical white bear that gracefully roamed the woods.

The Nêhiyawak held Ahcahk Muskwa in the highest regard, believing it to be the guardian of the forest and a symbol of the profound harmony that existed between humanity and the natural world. They possessed a song, a powerful and ancient chant that reverberated through the forest whenever they gathered to celebrate their deep-rooted connection to the land. "Way ah yah ho, way ah yah ho, yah way — o hey yo," they sang, their voices carrying the melodious notes like a gentle breeze through the rustling leaves. The song's lyrics resonated with a sacred presence, a call to Ahcahk Muskwa, beckoning it to draw nearer and share its timeless wisdom.

"Ahcahk Muskwa," they chanted, their voices harmonizing with the forest's heartbeat, "Ohti petotew." These words held the meaning of "Coming this way," a tender invitation to Ahcahk Muskwa, imploring it to approach. "Ahcahk Muskwa," they sang once more, their voices brimming with heartfelt devotion, "Sakihitownow," which translated to "To love us"-an affirmation of the profound affection they held for this quardian of the forest. The song would echo through the woods, repeated four times, each iteration strengthening the profound bond between the people and Ahcahk Muskwa. It served as an acknowledgment of the bear's presence and an expression of gratitude for its pivotal role in their lives. As they sang, the forest itself seemed to listen, and Ahcahk Muskwa, a creature rarely glimpsed by outsiders, would occasionally grace them with a brief



appearance—a shimmering, white figure amidst the verdant trees. Across generations, the Nêhiyawak continued to sing their Ahcahk Muskwa song, diligently passing it down from knowledge keepers to the youngest among them. It became an integral facet of their cultural heritage, serving as a poignant reminder of their solemn responsibility to safeguard the land and all its inhabitants. In response, Ahcahk Muskwa seemed to heed their calls, appearing more frequently, almost as if to assure them of its enduring presence.

As the river of time flowed onward, Ahcahk Muskwa and the Nêhiyawak nation coexisted in tranquil harmony, their destinies forever intertwined. The song, a timeless refrain, persisted, echoing through the forest and carrying with it the ancient wisdom of a people who comprehended the paramount importance of living in perfect accord with the natural world. In the heart of the Nêhiyawak territory, Ahcahk Muskwa continued to stand as the guardian of Mother Earth, an everlasting emblem of the indomitable bond between humanity and the boundless wonders of nature.

learning and performance opportunities, including participation in sports games, festivals, and other events that showcase their musical talents and teamwork skills.


