This LLL council, rooted in the Nation's codes, signifies a commitment to self-governance and cultural preservation. It will oversee the strategic plan, ensuring it remains dynamic and reflective of the Nation's evolving needs.

The strategic plan's nature as a living document ensures ongoing engagement with the Nation, including Elders and educational leaders. This approach allows the plan to evolve, adapting to the Nation's changing needs and aspirations.

The Lifelong Learning Strategic Plan 2024-29 and the Lifelong Learning Council represent a transformative approach to education within the Kapawe'no First Nation. It's a model of how education can align with a nation's cultural, spiritual, and sovereign identity, serving as an example for indigenous and nation-centric learning systems globally. Celebrating Nêhiyawak miyo Pimachihowin Team Spirit: The Winter Festival with Spirit North

Kapawe'no First Nation - The Winter Festival on day two, enhanced by the involvement of Spirit North, turned into a remarkable event of our ancestral ways and active participation. Central to the festival were traditional Nêhiyawak and Blackfoot games, which were not only a source of fun but also a means of connecting students to Nêhiyawak miyo Pimachihowin.

One of the highlights was the game of Double Ball, a traditional activity with profound cultural roots in both Nêhiyawak and Blackfoot Nations. Played predominantly by women, this game, resembling modern lacrosse, required high physical endurance and strategic team play. The equipment and rules varied regionally, but generally, it involved two small balls connected by a leather thong, caught and thrown using a curved stick. The aim was to score points by hitting a target in the opponent's area, with an intriguing field length that could stretch up to a mile. The game's importance goes beyond mere physical exercise, historically serving as a symbol of strength and empowerment, particularly among women.

Additionally, the festival featured Back Tag, an engaging and cooperative game that highlights the importance of agility and strategy. Other games like Shinny, akin to hockey, and Corralling the Buffalo, emphasizing teamwork and strategy, were also part of the festival's activities, offering a broad view of the rich sporting traditions of the Nêhiyawak and Blackfoot Nation.

"The day was a celebration of traditional games great learning experience. Spirit North's involvement helped to underscore the importance of such cultural exchanges", said Mr Fred Mack.

The festival's success is a testament to the enduring appeal and relevance of these traditional games. It was a day of joyful competition, cultural enrichment, and community spirit, honoring the teachings of



Love, Respect, Courage, Wisdom, Humility, Honesty, and Truth, which are the cornerstone of Nêhiyawak miyo Pimachihowin.

"Their work in empowering our youth through sport and play is pivotal in fostering both physical well-being and cultural pride", stated Mr Mack.
